



Follies' new show delights audiences

It has been a rough beginning for the young performers of the Gold Fever Follies, but halfway through the second season of Rossland's summer theatre they are still smiling as they sing and dance up a storm.

The resignations of several cast members before and after the season began may have played havoc with the nerves of cast and crew. But the view from the audience is one of a relaxed good time as the delightfully hokey musical tale of Oh, My Darling, Clementine unfolds.

Not content to rest on the laurels of a successful first season producerdirector Ray Furlotte and music director Mary Howard have developed a totally new, and morerounded show for the new season at the Miner's Hall in Rossland. This year's production has more of a storyline, which follows the maneouvering of Darling Clementine. She is trying to keep her father, who has failed to strike it rich in the Rossland gold rush, from drinking them into the poor house.

At the same time she is trying to coax the dashing but bashful sheriff Alex to pop the question. These were the days when "the question" wasn't "Do you have AIDS?" and men were men, and woman were girls, ladies or shameless hussies. If you have trouble suspending your disbelief or laughing at jokes about boozing in this age when overindulgence is no longer considered funny, then stay home. This is summer froth all the way and has to be viewed as such.

A particularly comic scene is the annual snowshoe race down main street which features a strobelighted brawl at the starting line.

Last year's star Tina Moore has just returned to show to take over the role of Clemintine from Anna Steckle. Moore's voice is splendidly strong and clear and the production was lucky lure her back to replace Steckle, who is also no slouch in the

Gallery a treat

When the 45-minute Gold Fever Follies are over in the Rossland Miner's Hall, the entertainment is just beginning.

Awaiting patrons in the basement is the Granite Gallery, which has been vastly improved from last year. The juried exhibition is filled with delightful canvasses, photographs, and various toys and crafts.

Gallery director Ingrid Baker's work is particularly eye-catching. Her watercolors go beyond the often staid, still lifes and landscapes on display at local shows. Her stillife photography is equally impressive, with a light and almost surrealistic quality about them.

Trail artist Mary Elliot has an

abstract landscape called Magic Forest III which is intriguing, and there is plenty of solid work by familiar local artists such as George Bourchier.

Some of the work in the crafts and toys section is exquisite with area weavers showing just how talented they are. Willa Johnson's toy clowns are charming and will no doubt all be sold by summers end.

Also on display either for sale or viewing are a few antiques, including the hall's original piano.

In addition to the careful selection of works, the gallery has been thoughtfully arranged making it an extremely pleasant setting to spend a half hour or more after the Follies.
